SANE Australia is funded entirely by donation and project grants, with no ongoing government funding. A responsible, well-managed investment portfolio funds the majority of SANE's operating costs and ensures donations directly fund the core business of the organisation: influencing a change in attitudes towards mental illness and helping those in need.

SANE operates Australia's only national Freecall helpline for information and advice for people affected by mental illness, and their families and friends. Through education, research and campaigning, SANE works to improve people's access to treatment, support in the community and to end stigma and discrimination.

'Focusing on our sustainability means that SANE Australia can ensure a continued commitment to Australians affected by mental illness. However, there is much more to be done in this area. Mental health services in Australia have a long way to go and SANE will continue to campaign to increase understanding of mental illness and improve access to services for all Australians.' Ms Hocking said.
